Vinci Surgical Robotics
Program. A sophisticated
robotic platform designed to
enable complex surgery using a
minimally-invasive approach,

robot-assisted surgery offers smaller incisions, less pain, lower risk of infection, less blood loss, and faster recovery.

Of course, we didn't do this alone. The launch of the Kanas Center, as well as the opening of our brand new, state-of-the-art Emergency Center, were made possible in large part by the community ... and for the community.

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On the first floor of the new surgical pavilion, adjacent to the Medical Center's sun-drenched atrium, there remains an unfinished 18-bed advanced physical therapy and rehabilitation unit. Here, post-surgical orthopedic patients, as well as people learning to cope with the effects of stroke or the loss of a limb, will work with our team of top-notch physical and occupational therapists toward one common goal: to leave the hospital and resume their lives.

In order to help the rehabilitation center meet its goal, we must first meet ours. And that goal – to raise enough funds to complete this much-needed rehabilitation unit – is just within our sight.

### Why expand Peconic Bay's rehabilitation programs?

Because our communities need them. An ever-increasing elderly population translates into an ever-increasing need to address medical conditions often requiring rehabilitation medicine:

- \* Stroke
- \* Joint replacements
- \* Neurological disorders
- \* Muscular disorders
- \* Amputations
- \* Compromised cardiac ' function
- \* Circulatory disorders
- \* Diabetes
- \* Obesity
- \* Orthopedic traumas

All of these challenges require comprehensive physical therapy and rehabilitation – and Peconic Bay stands poised to meet those needs. This new rehabilitation unit is an integral part of Peconic Bay Medical Center's full-spectrum, continuum-of-care services which include a 60-bed skilled nursing facility, an outpatient physical therapy center, and a certified home health program.



#### The new look of rehabilitation

Designed by the nationally-recognized architectural firm of Victor Famulari Architect, PC, Peconic Bay's inpatient rehabilitation unit's primary goal is to enable patients to overcome physical challenges and regain independence.

Combining advanced rehabilitative equipment, a 1,380-square-foot physical therapy gymnasium and a fully-equipped kitchen, each patient's needs — including physical and occupational therapy — will be met.

The unit also has 18 spacious private rooms, all of which are 1 ½ times larger than the size required by the American Institute of Architects and the New York State Department of Health.

Each room has ample sunlight flowing through oversized windows, private, handicapped-accessible bathrooms, a flatscreen high-definition television, and wireless high-speedinternet access.
